Job Summary

The Research Programme on “Opportunity, Mobility and Intergenerational Transmission of Inequality” of the International Inequalities Institute is building a repository of information on inequality of opportunity and intergenerational mobility around the world, which is eventually intended for public access. It is known as the Global Estimates of Opportunity and Mobility. The post holder will assist the III Director and the research programme leaders in the development, maintenance, and documentation of this database. They will also be expected to draw on the database and the methods used to construct it in order to develop original, high-quality research about horizontal inequalities and the intergenerational transmission of socioeconomic conditions.

This research is expected to lead to high-quality academic publications concerning methodological and empirical aspects of the analysis of opportunity and mobility. The post-holder may also be expected to contribute to publications and reports for a broader audience, such as consultation and policy interventions, through blogs and other social media outlets. The appointee will work with a wider team of LSE academics and will assist the Director of the III and research programme leaders in the organization of regular meetings and topic development more broadly.

The post-holder will also be expected to play a full role in the work of the III by organizing seminars, other events and contributing to its public interventions and web presence.

Duties and Responsibilities

- Assembling and assessing comparable information on intergenerational mobility from multiple countries, drawing on published sources and/or original data.
- Documenting these estimates and assessing their quality and comparability over time and across space
- Developing new tools and methods for the study of mobility and inequality of opportunity using large administrative datasets.
- Developing an original research programme of the person's own choosing on issues related to the database, or drawing on its data.



- Writing up research outputs for academic outlets, working papers, presentations or blogs, in a timely manner
- Coordinating, preparing and writing of research bids to a variety of funding sources
- Helping in the organizing and conducting of engagement activities, including building networks, presenting at conferences, seminars and workshops
- Attending and participating in Institute meetings and contributing towards the intellectual life of the unit
- Contributing to the development of individuals, through mentoring of students and research staff.
- Playing a constructive role in the life of the Institute.

Flexibility

To deliver services effectively, a degree of flexibility may be required in the duties performed in order to meet the exigencies of service. Job roles may also naturally develop over time and ongoing substantial changes to a role will be discussed between line managers and their staff, with job descriptions updated as and when appropriate.
