Job Summary

The Department of International Relations proposes to appoint a LSE Fellow in International Political Economy from 1 September 2017 (25 months fixed-term, until 30 September 2019) with the option of annual renewal to a maximum appointment of three years. The Department is seeking to appoint a candidate with expertise in international political economy with the ability to teach on core courses and undergraduate and MSc optional courses on the global business in international relations. The successful candidate will be someone with relevant teaching experience and a promising research profile.

Duties and Responsibilities

Teaching

- Contributing to the scholarship and intellectual life of the School by conducting teaching which will enhance the School's high reputation as a research-led teaching institution.
- Supervising, teaching and examining undergraduate and masters level students through lectures, classes, seminars, course work and tutorials, especially in IR470 International Political Economy and the MSc course IR453 Global Business in International Relations.
- Acting as academic adviser to BSc, General Course and MSc students and providing pastoral care
- Providing guidance to MSc academic advisees for their end of year 10,000-word dissertation, and referring advisees to colleagues with relevant expertise where appropriate.
- Holding regular office hours (at least 2 per week).
- Marking formative essays, assessed essays and examination papers during the academic year; and marking dissertations.
- Contributing to setting of examination papers and organising examination script distribution and collation of marks to/from markers and other examination-related duties, as required.
- Participating in regular departmental and teaching meetings, with academics and administrators involved in the course(s).
- Identifying learning needs of students and defining appropriate learning objectives.



Research

- Developing a research programme and publication record eg through publication(s) arising from the PhD
- Contributing to the intellectual life of the International Relations Department by actively participating in research-related seminars and events.

Administration

• Managing academic administration arising from teaching responsibilities.
